Mrs. Burkey has taught at Central for 16 years and has been Chairman of the English Department for the past four years. 1	Due to the changes of the chairmanships on the National level, the State Societies have been asked to revamp their chairmanships. Such chairmanships as American Art, American Literature, American Music and many others have either been cut or combined to form 9 chairmanships, 2 standing committees, and 2 convention committees. Mrs. Mohr, the new Sr. State President, and Debbie Whitaker, State President decided to make these chairmanships into committees with a chairman and 3 members, one from each district.
