THIRTY-FIRST STATE CONFERENCE

The thirty-first annual State Conference of the Children of the American Revolution was held Friday and Saturday, March 14 and 15 at the Johnstown Sheraton-Inn. Friday evening a poolside supper was held for the members. A senior dinner-meeting was held prior to the opening session.

Friday night session began at 7:30 p.m. with Mrs. Donald Mohr, Sr. State P^Resident presenting the Pennsylvania State Society's President, Miss Deborah Whitaker, who presided at all meetings during the two-day conference.

Greetings were brought from the National Society PResident, Rodney Schmidt, DAR State Regent, Mrs. Corray Miller, and SAR State President, Mr. Frank Strickland, Mr. Joseph Remavich, Assistant Manager of the Sheraton Inn, and Mr. Kleinmeyer, President of Johnstown City Council.

Reports of the State Chairmen were given and awards made to societies, and individuals for outstanding work completed during the year. Kitty Engstrom presented the slate of candidates for State offices.

Endowment pins were received by Deborah Whitaker, State P^Resident, Betsy Whitaker, President of Conemach Society, and Mary Jean Wilson, President of Brandywine Society. SAR State Good Citizenship medal was awarded to Deborah Whitaker, State President, by Mr. Frank Strickland, Penna. State PResident SAR.

Candidates Party immediately followed the closing of the business session. It was held in the Pool Area, music furnished by the "Hot Gossip", dancing, swimming and electioneering was enjoyed by all.

Saturday morning's session began at 9:00 a.m. State Band concert wakened all members that were still a little sleepy. Reports of all State officers were given, followed by a report of the Credentials committee. State Chorus concert kept the meeting on a lively mood. Voting began at 10:00 a.m. During voting, reports of Society Presidents were given. Group singing was enjoyed by all until the results of the voting was tallied.

The Memorial Service was held at 2:00 p.m. at the Episcopal Church, Locust St. Johnstown, Gregg Hartenstine, State Chaplain, officiated. The Rev. Park Allis gave the sermon.

At 3:00 p.m. dedication of the State Project, an outdoor identification plaque, was held at the Johnstown Flood Museum, a National historic museum. State President Deborah Whitaker presided, acceptance by Mr. Costello, President of the Museum. All members attending the conference participated in this service.

Photographs at 6:30 p.m. Dinner-dance began at 7:00 p.m. Concluding remarks by Deborah Whitaker, out-going State President. Rodney Schmidt, NSCAR President installed all newly elected state officers except the State President, who will be installed during the National Convention.

Television coverage was tremendous. Registration was shownon the 6:15 news, the business session shown at 11:00 p.m. dedication of the State Project was shown at 6:15 Saturday, and again at 11:00 p.m. A lengthy article appeared in the Johnstown Tribune, Monday, March 10.

Even though we had a heavy snow fall Friday and Friday night attendance was good.


PENNSYLVANIA --THAT'S OUR STATE
