Each survey would be marked that the Pennsylvania State Society Children of the American Revolution gave it to the Adams County Historical Society. The surveys were made in York and Adams Counties largely between 1765 and 1800. TRUE HEROISM MAKES ITS OWN APPEAL

Prof. Edwin Pugh, graduate of Geneva College in Beaver Falls, Penna., has been concerned about the slight knowledge about one of American's true heroes. In New York where he studies summers, and in his university classes in Florida, Prof. Pugh found an appalling disinterest in the life and death of Nathan Hale.

It is one of the ironies of history that many youth admire the dashing, poetic and artistic British spy, John Andre, hanged by the Americans after a full trial, and fed during his imprisonment from Washington's table. They also identify, in part, with the impulsive, egotistical Benedict Arnold. Nathan Hale was too young, modest, and loyal to be kept in the index of most histories. Self-portraits and a diary of Andre exist, and Britain honored his memory with a monument and burial in Westminster Abby. The grave of Nathan Hale is unknown, and even the usual town records were burned when defector Arnold, the co-conspirator with Andre, burned Richmond; Ft. Griswold; and Hale's hometown of New London, Connecticut.

Twenty-one year old Nathan Hale was captured by the British while gathering information about the enemy for Washington. He admitted his guilt, and without the semblance of a trial was handed over to provost-marshal Cunningham for hanging the next morning. His request for a clergyman and the use of a Bible was denied. A kind hearted guard did slip him paper, ink, and pen. Nathan Hale, a graduate of Yale at the age of sixteen and a school teacher until he volunteered for his country, spent his last hours penning messages to his fiancée, his sisters, and his mother. On September 22, 1776 as Nathan made the one verbal statement about "I only regret that I have but one life to lose for my country", the brutal Cunningham tore up all the letters, then had Nathan hanged. (Cunningham's excuse was that he "did not want the rebels to know that they had a man who could die with such firmness.")

This summer, on a "hunch" that even very young children would respond to the truth about a real hero, a grandmother stated a few of the above facts to her grandchildren. Three generations were seated at the table, and for a moment there was silence, then seven year old Suzy said, "I know what he wrote." She lifted her face to her family and softly said, "he wrote, 'Dear Mommy, I love you, love you, love you, love you. .'" As her voice trailed into silence her eleven year old brother responded, "I know what he wrote. He wrote, 'Dear Mother, I have news for you, good and bad. The good news is that Washington is a great leader. The bad news is that he needs help. The good news is that I saw a way to help him. The bad is that it was dangerous. The good news is that I volunteered and was successful. The bad is that I was caught. It's good news that I'm still alive. The bad is that I die at daylight and this is my last chance to say, I love you. Your devoted son, Nathan.'"

When Suzy and John David had finished their spontaneous responses to America's unsung hero there was the certainty in that room that thoughtful people of any, and every generation recognize the true role of being Children of the American Revolution. The ungarnished facts of the ideals of a patriot speak to the heart forever, and surmount the attempts of the traitors and tyrants to bury them in oblivion. With the children who cross all generation gaps all thoughtful people can quietly say, "Nathan Hale, we, too, love you, love, love you. . ."

SUGGESTED C.A.R. MEMBERSHIP METHODS

FINDING PROSPECTS

Canvas thoroughly local DAR, S.A.R. and S.R. membership.

Present a good program at local schools and community organizations so that others are aware of C.A.R.

Bring a friend of member age to a meeting or activity.

Wherever you go promote C.A.R. let people know what C.A.R. is doing.

Participate in public activities (such as fairs, parades, bake sales, etc. Use eye-catching displays. Members and Senior Leaders should be prepared so they can provide answers to questions about C.A.R. and be available for further contact.

GETTING PROSPECTS INTERESTED

Be an informed C.A.R. member. Familiarize yourself with the handbook and the current year's programs of the National committees so you can tell people what C.A.R. is doing.

Be enthusiastic. Tell why C.A.R. means so much to you. Let prospective members know what it could mean to them.

Give a membership party. Be novel when deciding what kind of party you will give.

Use your telephone to keep in touch with prospective members. Send them copies of your society newsheet.

Include them in society activities.

ENROLLING THE PROSPECTS

Use short forms whenever possible.

Ask your sponsoring chapter for volunteers to do genealogical research on new lineages.

Invite one member or senior to take charge of typing applications.

Take applications to the prospects for signing. Submit applications to National Headquarters immediately.

RETAINING THE MEMBERS
