State Conference plans are being finalized and hope YOU are planning to attend. (March 5,6) There will be something of interest for all.


Please, State Chairman send your report to Susan and I. The information is needed for our State reports.

YORK - THE FIRST CAPITOL

York has many interesting tourist attractions. During the Bicentennial year would be a good time to visit.

The York County, Courthouse was where the articles of Confederation were signed. This was the first time the name "The United States of America" was used officially; thus, York became the first Capitol. As part of our Bicentennial celebration. a replica of the original courthouse is now being built.

Near the replica of the Courthouse is where the General Gates House & Golden Plough Tavern is located. The tavern was built in 1741 and is the oldest surviving house in York. It is of medieval style Germanic construction with heavy half-timbering. The gates House was constructed ten years later and is English in design and decoration. It was here that General Horatis Gates lived while he was Chairman of the Board of War, having been called to York by the Continental Congress after his victory at Saratoga.

James Smith, York's signer of the Declaration of Independence owned an iron furnace on the Cordoius Creek ten miles northeast of York. It was called the Cordoius Furnace and Forge and it produced cannon iron and cannon balls for those troops at Valley Forge and later for the War of 1812. It continued in operation until 1850.

There are many other historical places in York. We hope you will find time to visit York in 1976.
