endowment pins.

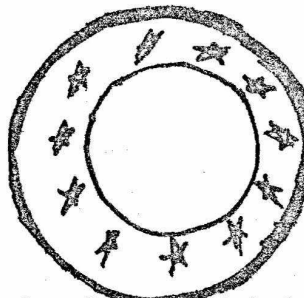

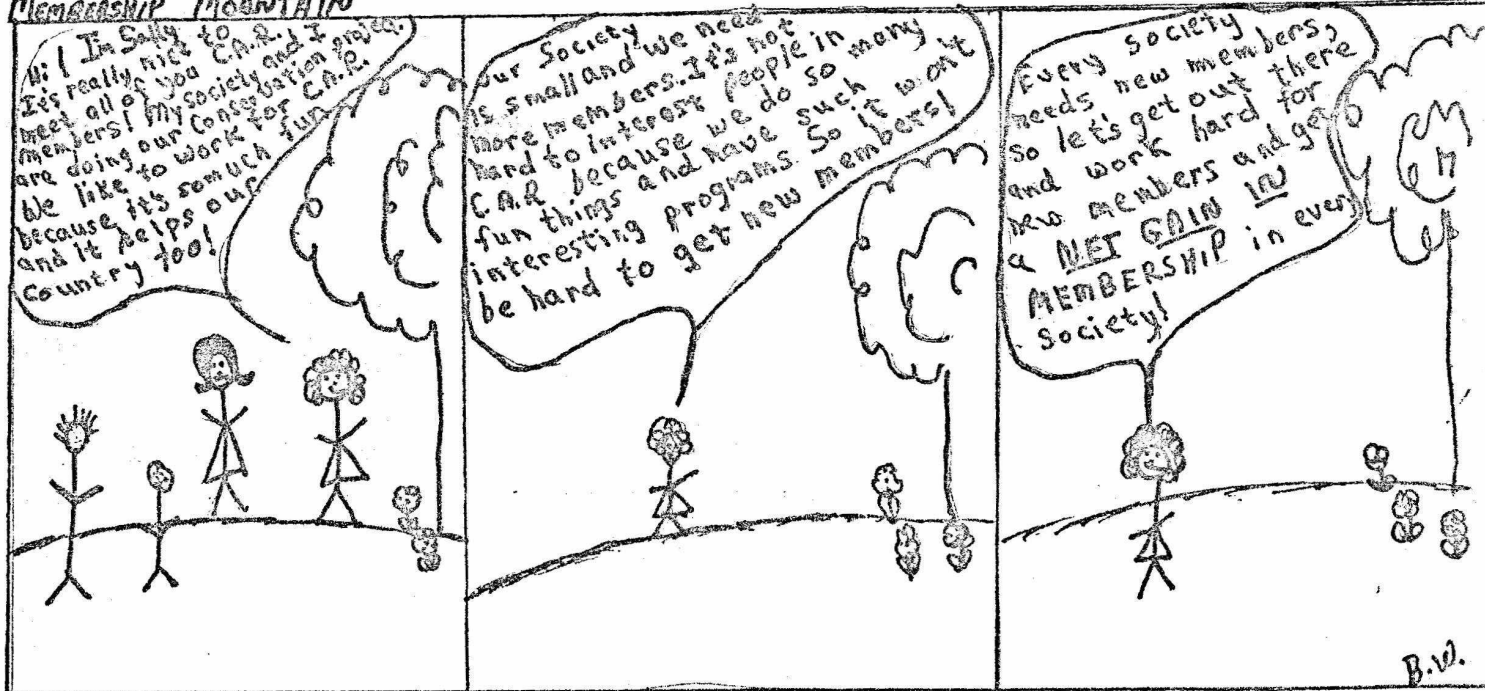
