

Members collected old flags from their schools and friends to be burned in an official ceremony. It was a beautiful sunny day. Over all, it was a great send off for Old Glory.

Ceremony Honors Young Girl Killed at Hanna's Town

On Saturday, May 31, 2014 a wreath laying ceremony was held at the grave of Peggy Shaw in the Middle Presbyterian Church Cemetery in Mount Pleasant. The Peggy Shaw Society of the Children of the American Revolution was founded and named after Peggy Shaw in the 1950s. A bronze marker was placed at her grave on October 14, 1954 and another one was placed inside the fort at

Hanna's Town by our society. This was the first grave marker ceremony by a C.A.R. society within the state of Pennsylvania.

Hanna's Town was the first seat of government in Westmoreland County. In 1775 local men gathered at the tavern to sign their names to a document called the Hanna's Town Resolves wherein they agreed to take up arms, if it was necessary, to prevent more tyrannical acts by King George III and Parliament.

Peggy was only 12-13 years of age when a war party came down from Fort Niagara on July 13, 1782 to burn Hanna's Town. She was shot and mortally wounded after running out of the fort to rescue a small child. The burning of Hanna's Town was one of the last acts to take place during the Revolutionary War. Peggy was taken to Mount Pleasant where she died from her wounds two weeks later.

Our May 31 ceremony marks nearly 60 years since that bronze marker was placed there to honor Peggy and 232 years since she was killed. This was a joint collaboration between our local society and Braddock Trail Chapter NSDAR which sponsors us.

After the ceremony, we drove to Hanna's Town where we had a picnic lunch followed by a meeting where we nominated new society officers: President, Caitlyn Williams; Vice President, Nolan Westerlund; Chaplain, J.T. Nicholson; Registrar, Carly Williams; Treasurer, Kaitlyn Nicholson; Corresponding Secretary, Kayla Reed; Recording Secretary, Jack Gentry; Librarian, Brennen Westerlund; Historian, Natasha Gentry. We enjoyed a tour of Hanna's Town after our meeting. The weather was incredibly beautiful; sunny and 77 degrees.

Trip to Flag House and Fort McHenry

O! Say can you see? Yes! The Conrad Weiser Society can see! 10 members of the society along with 6 friends and a bevy of seniors, including Carol Leon, Sr. National Vice President of the Eastern Region, flocked to the Star Spangled Banner Flag House and Fort McHenry on July 25th. Everyone was very anxious to learn more

about the National Project and the chain of events that culminated in our national anthem, "The Star Spangled Banner".

We learned that during the War of 1812, Major George Armistead, commander at Fort McHenry, ordered a huge flag from Mary Pickersgill, a seamstress that lived in Baltimore. Major Armistead wanted a flag that was so large that the British would have no trouble seeing it at a distance!

Creating such large flag was a challenge for Mary and she needed to rent space from a nearby brewery. Her workers sewed the flag at night when the brewery was closed. In spite of the challenges, Mary completed the flag in about 6 weeks, along with a second, smaller flag to be flown during foul weather.

In September 1814, after the British sacked the capital, they proceeded up the bay to capture Baltimore. However, to get into the city they needed to capture Fort McHenry. On the evening of September 13th, they began a fierce bombardment to try and get the fort to surrender. During the battle, a local lawyer by the name of Francis Scott Key, was being detained onboard one of the British ships. From the ship he watched the bombardment. The attack ended before daybreak and Key wondered if the fort had surrendered. At dawn, he could finally see the huge flag was flying over the fort. The American's had won!

Key wrote his famous poem "Defense of Fort McHenry" that very morning. The poem was immediately popular and was joined with the melody of the song "To Anacreon in Heaven" and became known as "The Star Spangled Banner". For over a century the song was played on patriotic occasions and in 1931, it officially became our National Anthem!


